Though the weather is hardly truly summery yet, there are flowers and colours in abundance around the Gardens. I have been informed by several people that twenty years ago summers in Victoria were mostly like this, generally cloudy but with agreeable sunny breaks, but to be truly warm you needed to go inland. The last few years have obviously been different with 'heat domes' and droughts and the resultant wildfires turning our skies hazy and red. And though I have been wondering for some weeks when the heat is going to arrive I realise that I would actually be happy to have a year of more moderate weather; working in the intense heat can be very exhausting. So perhaps this year we could revert to former climate patterns and be blessed with a season of cooler conditions.

Yet walking around the Gardens the plants do not seem deterred by the overcast skies. The rhododendrons have been working hard to show their best and though some are now over there are still late varieties to enjoy. Columbines (*Aquilegia*) are everywhere and though we do not have any of the more exotic bi-coloured species, the range of colours of A. vulgaris alone is

impressive, white through pinks and purples and a delicious deep strawberry red. In the Takata stream bed the candelabra primulas (*Primula beesiana*) are looking their best while peonies have finally come into flower and their enormous frothy blooms are a wonder to behold.

In the upper gardens Alliums are taking centre stage. The big spherical flower heads in purples and blues remind me of fireworks, those huge spheres that burst in the sky above you. There are plantings of Allium giganteum in several places in the Hardy Beds and they look especially attractive popping up amongst the lime-yellow heads of Euphorbias. In the Lily Beds a close relative of these is Nectaroscordum siculum, a similarly tall bulbous perennial, but their umbels, rather than a tight sphere, are formed of hanging bells that attract masses of happy bees. And then again, not far away in the Herb Garden, more of the allium family, Chives (*Allium schoenoprasum*) are also fully in flower. So many marvellous decorative onions.

At the lower end of the Lily Garden the calla lilies (*Zantedeschia aethiopica*) are looking wonderful, their creamy white spathes creating striking contrasts with nearby red-hot pokers (*Kniphofia uvaria*), yellow Iris pseudacorus 'Variegata' and the rich orange of Geum 'Mrs Bradshaw'. The glaucous foliage of Parahebe perfoliata is covered now with its pale violet spikes of flowers and there is a Sanguisorba that is flourishing in the middle of the bed, its red upright catkin-like flowers standing proudly above surrounding plants.

I am fond of the many mound-forming plants that can hang over the edges of beds, creating soft curves and colourful floral cushions. In the Vegetable Garden they have some lovely examples of purple aubrietas (*Aubrieta x cultorum*) and Snow-in-Summer (*Cerastium tomentosum*) softening the edges of their vegetable plantings and just nearby in the Med Beds there is a pretty pink cistus in flower. Up the hill a little toward the pavilion the rock roses (*Helianthemum nummularium*) in the Drought Tolerant Garden are a gorgeously vivid red-orange and Convolvulus cneorum is just beginning to open there too.

We must not forget to mention the Iris Garden. Created relatively recently, the volunteers have spent time trying to create the well-drained conditions irises seem to prefer and I think, this year, we are beginning to see the results of all that work. There are now irises of all sorts in flower. Tall ones and short ones, massive flowers and small, colours from the deepest dark mauve to rust colour, yellows and pinks. Do take this opportunity to see them while they are at their best.

Another rock rose, pale pink this time, is blooming at the head of the Heather Garden and in the Three B's there is a marvellously frothy blue Thalictrum aquilegifolium. Foxgloves (*Digitalis spp*) are just starting to open in the Edible Beds and the woolly sunflowers (*Eriophyllum lanatum*) on the corner of the Native Plant Garden are beginning their startlingly sunny display.







Butterflies of British Columbia

If, like me, you're out in the garden more these days, you may happen upon a butterfly. How fortunate! Not only can they be a symbol of light and hope, their beauty can inspire joy.

And if, like me, you're wondering what the name of this butterfly is that you just happened upon, look no further than this HCP Library book, "Butterflies of British Columbia." It's an abundantly and beautifully illustrated, easy-to-use field guide showing 180 species and the intricacy of their wing patterns. Each listing's large illustrations help with identification. Similar species are also illustrated and described. The entries are rounded out with wingspan, alternative names, identification mark descriptions, preferred caterpillar food plants, habitat and flight season, and a B.C. map of known locations. Comments are in a conversational style rather than an academic reporting style.

"Butterflies of British Columbia" opens with a Quick Reference Guide; 9 pages of illustrations for at-a-glance identification with page numbers for further

investigation. The introduction includes helpful discussions on butterfly names, biology and identification. The back matter includes two indexes of names, a checklist and a glossary (buttergack is the annoying petty politics that butterfly enthusiasts sometimes exhibit!).

According to "Butterflies of British Columbia," most individual butterflies only live a week however their combined flight season may extend over a month or more. Take for example the Great Arctic butterfly (Oeneis nevadensis). It can be seen in June and early July, but only in even numbered years, as it has a two-year cycle. It lives in forest edges and clearings. This would be a spectacular find, as it is rare. Our more familiar Monarch butterfly (Danaus plexippus) migrates back to B.C. in June from its winter home in California. Hopefully efforts to save this species at risk will improve our opportunities to encounter it in our gardens.

So, whether you just happened upon a butterfly in your garden or you're a Lepidopterist, you'll be pleased you borrowed this book from the HCP Library.
