What an extraordinary October! We could definitely do with some heavy rains, but I am never going to complain about the warm golden sunshine we are enjoying day after day. And though the night temperatures are going down and down the days are sufficiently warm to keep the advance of fall at bay. Looking back to last year I see that the Japanese maple at the entrance to the Takata garden was at its glorious orange best on 17th October. Today, only five days away from that date, its leaves have hardly even begun to change. I do not always find the intense heat of midsummer easy to bear but these precious days of open blue skies and kindly temperatures are a gift for which I give thanks.

And I think the garden plants agree with me. The Cuttings Garden is still full of so many colourful blooms, cosmos, and calendula, echinacea and alyssum. And in the 3B's Garden beside it the Helianthus 'Lemon Queen' shines so bright it is almost hard to look at. Salvias are now as full of colour as they have been all season, the red and white of S.'Hot Lips' and the purple of S.'Amethyst Lips' filling the annual beds below the Rotunda and S.'Amistad' at the top of the Hardy Beds glowing a deep royal purple.

All through the upper gardens there is an intriguing range of shades of red and pink. Nearest to the office the dusky scarlet Alstroemeria sits close to the smokey pink of a clump of Gaura 'Belleza Dark Pink'. Bright red rose hips compete with the vivid scarlet of river lilies (Hesperantha coccinea). And then intense pinks come in many varieties, the powder pink of bulbous nerines (Nerine bowdenii), the varied fierce pinks of autumn anemones (Anemone japonica) and the almost artificial pinks of cosmos. Roses in the Rose Allee and fuchsias next door in the Fuchsia Garden display more vibrant strong reds and then I spot the deep pink of Sedums contrasting in a bed with the spikes of Japanese Bloodgrass (Imperata cylindrica) and I'm aware that there is really no limit to nature's constant variations.

But having remarked upon all these shades of red, I realise there are almost as many shades of purple. In the Winter Garden cyclamen have popped up and carpet the the upper beds. Are they pink or are they lilac? I would be hard put to declare either way, but they are definitely a wonderfully pale shade. And in the 3B's Aster 'Calliope' is another extremely pale lilac, contrasting so uniquely with their black stems. Everywhere in the Gardens Verbena bonariensis is standing proud, heads of somewhat darker lilac held aloft their tall deep green stems. And then we come to surely the star of the month, Monkshood (Aconitum napellus). This is such an impressive plant, I find it rather peculiar that it flowers so late in the year. It has so many similarities to Delphiniums and in fact it is in the same family, Ranunculaceae. Both leaf shape and flower form are alike, and both are tall imposing perennials with long stems of flowers though the colour range of Aconitum is narrower, essentially limited to deep purples and whites. But the flowers of Monkshood (or Wolf'sBane) are each topped by a 'helmet' requiring pollination by longtongued bumblebees and in contrast to Delphiniums they are not heavyfeeding plants, living much longer on poorer less fertile ground. But here now in October they are looking absolutely magnificent in the Hardy Borders. It should however be remembered that all parts of the plant are very poisonous, and they are best handled with gloves. The neurotoxin Aconitine has been used as a poison throughout history. It has been long used for arrow and spear tips in hunting and warfare and it is often the preferred means of murder in much literary fiction.





Beatrix Potter's Gardening Life: The plants and places that inspired the classic children's tales

Marta McDowell

Beatrix Potter (1866-1943) was enchanted by gardens from a young age. Long before the invention of Peter Rabbit (self-published in 1901 at 35), she was drawing and painting botanical illustrations. Her parents encouraged her and sent her to art lessons. And as an adolescent with health problems, this was her best method of coping. Fast forward to 1905, and after the death of her fiancé, Potter bought a working farm with a cottage and a modest garden.

Marta McDowell's Beatrix Potter's Gardening Life is part biography, part seasonal garden essay and part travelogue to the British landscapes that inspired Potter. It is profusely illustrated with her artwork (plants, fungi and landscapes), plus photos from the past and present. Tables of her plants (grown and published) round out this thorough inspection of the botanical aspect of her life.
