Happy New Year!


A new year brings new hope and ideas for your garden and a time to make resolutions.

New Year's resolutions that many of us won't be keeping

"Next year I promise not to buy any more plants until I have planted all the ones that are currently stored in the garage because I didn't get around to planting them this year."

No real gardener would ever put these kinds of constraints on themselves. After all, compulsive plant buying is a sign of a healthy, well- adjusted gardener. Just think of those plants as a portable test garden. If the plant can't survive at least two seasons of being moved in and out of the garage, then it probably isn't worthy of being planted. I usually manage to kill at least 30% of them every year by forgetting to water or letting the slugs decimate them or shoving them so close together that they suffocate each other before they ever get a chance to be planted. By the time I do get around to finding a home for them, they are tough as nails.

"My tool shed is going to be perfectly organized next year so I can always find what I need when I need it."

Oh right, a place for everything and everything in its place. Show me a gardener that is that organized, and I'll bet money they suffer from constipation. Dodging rakes and falling shovels helps us stay alert, it sharpens our reflexes and keeps our muscles toned. And as for tool maintenance, don't get me started. Oiling tools and cleaning the lawn mower at the end of the season only delays the excitement of shopping for replacements. Real gardeners long for the opportunity to acquire new and exotic gardening tools.

"Next year, I won't plant things too close together. I might even read the plant tags before planting."

Now here's a novel concept: actually, reading all those descriptive tags that nursery professionals provide for us. Real gardeners would never lower themselves to the level of reading tags. That's for the amateur. We buy plants because they are "cool" and because we have to have them. We design by impulse, buying a plant and then finding a place for it. As for planting too close together? Impossible! We all know that there is strength in numbers. Crowded plants hold each other up and they choke out weeds. We don't have to spend money or take the time to stake things up. Opulence, exuberance, and immoderation are the hallmark of a real gardener. Don't let anybody tell you otherwise.

"This year I'm going to stake my perennials before they bloom and pinch my mums so they aren't 8 feet tall by September."

These are classic examples of timely chores that real gardeners can't be bothered with. I have these wonderful "grow through rings" for my peonies somewhere in the gardening shed that are designed to be put over the peonies while they are still small (before they set their flower buds). Haven't got them on once in five years. But that's why they make "link stakes", bamboo stakes and stretch ties. Regarding fall blooming perennials like asters and mums that need pinching in June to keep them compact and bushy, I do manage to accomplish that task, but only because I own a hedge trimmer with a 30" bar that allows me to "pinch" them in about 30 seconds. Real gardeners love power tools.

Happy New Year everyone!

And I hope you are all enjoying the start of 2023, preferably sat in front of the fire, out of the blusterous cold winds.

But at least the temperature is now a lot warmer than that freezing blast we had before Christmas. And that heavy snowfall was both a shock and yet thankfully short-lived.

Here at the HCP Gardens we didn't have too much damage; one or two shrubs were crushed under the thick layer of snow, but they have now mostly recovered. Currently the wind is bringing down quite a lot of branches, but they are probably the weaker ones that were due to fall anyway so the wind is actually doing us a favour.

However, searching for flowers that I can mention, I am struck by their almost total absence. I have looked everywhere, especially in the Winter Garden, but I would say that it is an unusually bare scene this year. I suspect that the snow pinched back many plants, freezing off any buds and discouraging any more

early blossom. I remember, before we closed for Christmas, that there were one or two early rhododendrons beginning to open a flower or two; but there are certainly none now. They are sensibly being a little wary of exposing tender petals to any of winter's nasty surprises.

But which are the plants that are flowering despite everything? The Oregon grape (Mahonia nervosa) in the 3B's garden has a courageous flush of acid yellow flowers and the witch hazels (Hamamelis virginiana) in the Doris Page garden are flowering also. At the top of the Hardy Borders there is one Helleborus foetidus with two flowers and at the head of the Doris Page Garden there is a single bedraggled looking hellebore with two ragged white flowers.

But in the absence of flowers, berries and foliage have the opportunity to stand out and grab our attention. Fragrant sweet box (Sarcococca ruscifolia) has black berries hanging from its branches while Chinese quinine (Dichroa febrifuga) has bunches of gentian blue berries whose colour is quite startling on a grey day in January. Skimmias (S. japonica) too light up the beds with both red and white-berried varieties.

And walking the paths there are combinations of foliage that make one pause. In the Winter Garden lime green Sedum rupestre contrasts with the charcoal leaves of Black Mondo grass (Ophiopogon planiscapus 'Nigrescens'). Bright golden leaves of Ilex crenata 'Drops of Gold' bring out the purple in Pittosporum 'Tom Thumb' and the brightly variegated Yucca 'Garland Gold' hardly even needs a companion to accent its vivid colours.

Yes, January is grey and wet and windy, but it cannot take anything away from the ever-varied character of the Gardens.

Come weave a beautiful individualized small pouch with plant materials harvested from the Pacific Northwest. I use my pouch to hold my cell phone, so make sure you bring yours with you. We will begin with a discussion on how to respectfully harvest materials followed by a hands-on demonstration of how to prepare the materials including cedar bark, willow bark and sedge. Participants can design their pouch using different weave patterns presented which include a variety of plaiting, twining and twill variations. This course is suitable for beginners as well as experienced weavers.

Identification of Trees and Shrubs in Winter using Buds and Twigs

Identification of Trees and Shrubs in Winter Using Buds and Twigs

As well as cleaning tools and reading seed catalogues, there is now an opportunity for gardeners to take a close look at plants in their winter state. For the enthusiast there is a guide to identifying almost every temperate tree that we are likely to find growing in our gardens and arboretums. *Identification of Trees and Shrubs in Winter Using Buds and Twigs* is a monumental taxonomic reference work published by Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew.

To help guide us through a systematic approach to the identification of deciduous woody plants in winter, this book by Bern Schulz includes an identification key and a quick reference key. Over 1900 drawings and paintings by the author make this comprehensive manual a practical tool.

Most of this hefty volume covers true dicotyledons, but other angiosperms and gymnosperms are also studied. The Basics of Botany chapter covers the structure of woody plants including stems, prickles and fruit. The Index to Botanical Terms helps make it more accessible.

While visually very attractive, this authoritative study is not a light read. But if you want to see the difference in winter between a clematis and a ginko, or if you want to identify your species of willow, this book just might be the one for you. It's available to borrow now from the HCP Library.
