Testing seed for Viability

We start thinking about starting seeds this time of year, and if you are like me you have envelopes of seeds you collected or open seed packets and are not sure if they are still viable.

Most seeds will be viable for 3-4 years if they've been stored under optimal conditions- a dark, cool location. I store mine in a sealed glass jar in the refrigerator.

Water test: Take your seeds and put them in a glass of water. Let them sit for about 15 minutes. If the seeds sink, they are still viable, if they float, they most likely will not germinate. In my opinion, is not the best way to check your seeds. For more reliable results, try the germination test.

Germination test: Take some of your seeds, preferably 10, and place them in between two pieces of damp paper towel, place in a zip-up plastic bag and seal it, this helps to keep the towel moist and protected. Then refer to the seed packet or website for optimal germination requirement(light/dark, warm/cool) and check the seeds once a day to see if they have begun to germinate and/or to check the moisture of the paper towel. If it needs more water, carefully mist the towel keeping it damp, and keep them away from direct sunlight. If 7 out of 10 seeds germinate, then you have 70% germination which is good.



A guideline for seed longevity from our friends at West Coast Seed:

Vegetable seeds that are considered "long-lived" include the Brassicas (broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, cabbage, collards, and kohlrabi) the chicory group (endive, escarole,

radicchio), cucumber, kale, lettuce, melons, mustards, peppers, radish, rutaba ga, sunflower, tomato and turnips. Stored correctly, these seeds should maintain a good viability for more than five years.

"Medium-lived" varieties

include beans, carrots, celery, chard, eggplant, parsley, peas, pumpkin, and squash. These varieties, if properly stored, should last up to five years.

"Short-lived" seeds include **corn**, **leek**, **onion**, **parsnip**, and **spinach**. These are generally not recommended for more than one season, although they may maintain acceptable germination rates in the second year.

Pelleted seeds should be bought fresh each year.

I am a little nervous of declaring that Spring has begun.

I feel that we have had more cold snaps this winter than in recent years and to assume that we are finished with the cold weather is surely tempting fate. But for a couple of days in a row the cold night temperatures have given way to partially blue skies and some very agreeable sunshine, getting warm enough to necessitate removing my winter jacket. What a nice way to start the week.

And the lengthening days have encouraged many spring plants to try exposing their heads above the ground. When last week's snow finally melted, I was pleased to find that the snowdrops had already started popping up and throughout the Winter Garden and the Lily beds extensive carpets of pendulous white bells were brightening up the cold winter soil. Furthermore, it is not necessarily well-known but in the Fusion Garden, just across the main path from the Rhododendron Garden, we have a fascinating collection of many different snowdrop varieties that definitely merits a visit. The common snowdrop, Galanthus nivalis, is a perennial spring bulb that produces two narrow grey-green leaves and a flower stem supporting the familiar white hanging bell. The flower is essentially formed of six petals, or more accurately tepals, three longer outer ones and then three shorter ones that make up the inner 'skirts' and these inner skirts usually have some sort of greenish V-shaped marking.



But looking at the different varieties one comes to appreciate how even such a simple flower as the snowdrop can vary, in size, colour, number of petals and variability of the green markings.

The collection we have at the HCP contains both cultivars of G. nivalis and also some of the twenty or more different species of Galanthus found worldwide.

Unfortunately, many of the varieties have already been attacked by slugs so I have not been able to get very good photos but hopefully in the coming years the groupings will develop and expand and become strong enough that the odd slug will not be such a threat.

Of the G. nivalis cultivars one or two stand out; G. nivalis 'Straffan' is a late flowering variety and, unusually, produces two flowering stems rather than one. Galanthus 'George Elwes' is a particularly tall variety and its green markings run all the way down the outside of the inner petals. Galanthus 'Elfin' is, as its name suggests, a miniature variety, slightly honey-scented with a pale green marking on the tips of the outer petals. And G. nivalis 'Dionysus' is one of a group known as the Greatorex Doubles, hybrids of Galanthus plicatus and Galanthus nivalis 'Flore Pleno', created by one of the first snowdrop breeders, Heyrick Greatorex, in the 1950's. G. 'Dionysus' is distinguished by spectacular inner skirts with double the number of petals and extensive green markings. You can also see a couple of quite different species; Galanthus woronowii is from north-eastern Turkey and most noticeably its leaves are a bright glossy green colour while Galanthus reginae-olgae (Queen Olga's snowdrop) has its origins in Sicily and, in contrast to most of the others, flowers in the fall.



However, though I have been somewhat captivated by the snowdrops, already a wonderful assortment of other spring bulbs and perennials are lighting up the Gardens with their colourful displays. Walking up the hill from the Farm Garden the lower beds of the Doris Page Garden are on your left, followed by the Heather Garden beds, and they are a delight, awash with yellows, pinks and oranges. Facing the new Crevice Garden are several attractive heathers flowering in pink and white and yellow but one that caught my eye is Calluna vulgaris 'Zoe' that has a range of fiery colour from red to orange. Yet to my surprise, when I investigated further, I discover it is a heather that was bred to be non-flowering and all that powerful bright colour is its foliage alone.

A few steps further and the lower Winter Garden beds are full of crocuses and dwarf irises, yellow primroses (Primula vulgaris) and purple hellebores. Several mounds of Hebe 'Silver Dollar' are looking beautiful, their stems evolving from grey to pale green and then pink at the tips. And these pink shades are mirrored by heathers further up the hill, the mature plants creating interwoven pillows of whites and pinks and mauves. In the Lily Garden there are vivid purple Anemone blanda and buttery yellow Helleborus 'Spring Promise Sally'.

It is impossible to keep track of every emerging plant but that is why walking around the Gardens is such a joy; every day there is something new to see, another bud that is opening, more coloured petals squeezing their way out into the sunshine.

Papermaking with Wild, Invasive and Garden Plants

Following this they will handbeat pre-cooked invasive Daphne/Spurge laurel (Daphne laureola) fibers to a fine pulp. There will also be smaller quantities of prepared pulp from common wild and cultivated plants for experimentation. Each participant will have their own station with supplied equipment to make Western style paper. Papers will be dried and pressed in the days following the workshop and be ready for pickup up at HCP.

Papermaking is a wet process. If you have one, bring a waterproof apron, and wear shoes that can get wet.

Terrarium Gardens



Perennial Vegetables

Eric Toensmeier

To expand the bounds of your kitchen garden, consider checking out *Perennial Vegetables* by Eric Toensmeier. This catalogue of plant profiles includes some exotic and unusual species, little-known and underappreciated. Consider Lycium barbarum (wolfberry or goji berry). While it isn't a cure-all for disease, it's shoots, leaves and berries are used in traditional Asian cuisine. It is one in a long list of perennial vegetables of Toensmeier's recommendations for Pacific Northwest gardening. Other surprising options include fuki, jinenjo, achira, and scorzonera.

The idea with perennial vegetables is that they complement annuals, not replace them. Being low-maintenance and extending the harvest season gives them some advantages as food crops. They can taste delicious, yield abundantly, and produce for many years without replanting, benefits that will be attractive to many gardeners.

Toensmeier also discusses tips and techniques, design ideas, and native vs.non-native. Each of the over 100 thorough plant profiles includes a North American map of growth range, history, ecology, preferences, harvest, uses and much more. Many drawings and photographs supplement the text.

This American Horticultural Society book award-winner was written by a permaculture advocate and teacher who brings enthusiasm and expertise to the topic of edible perennials. Available now to borrow from the HCP Library.
