Abutilon vitifolium

- A frost hardy Flowering Maple.
- It needs a well-drained, protected site in full sun.
- Large lavender flowers appear in May, growing to be a multi-branched shrub to 2m.Felty gray green foliage



Verbena 'Bampton'

- This is a wonderful variety of Verbena discovered in the village of Bampton.
- It has dark foliage with clouds of lavender-pink flowers that bloom from June-frost,1m height, full to part sun



Campanula takesimana

- Known as Korean Bellflower, clump forming perennial to 70cm
- Full sun to part shade, pink drooping bells, spotted inside



Clematis tangutica

- A species Clematis with bright yellow bell shape flowers throughout the summer
- Attractive feathery seed heads
- Climber or groundcover to 4m



If I were obliged to make a choice of which is my favourite moment in the gardening year, I would have to pick that time in May when every plant suddenly starts to grow at full speed as if they felt they were in danger of missing the starting gun. But surely running it a close second is where we are now, the period of late August easing into September, when every fruit and vegetable plant is offering us a bonanza of delicious produce.

And this year in Victoria seems to be a truly bumper year.



I cannot find a single fruit tree that is not loaded down with ripening fruit. Apples and pears, plums and figs, grapes, blueberries, and persimmons; blackberries, Asian pears, and quince.

It is not always as prolific a year as this, and I ask myself what has made it so amazing. I would have thought that our lack of rain would have put a dent in the productivity, but I see no evidence of that. Pollination in the spring is definitely affected by the weather and though I cannot precisely remember the temperatures week by week through March and April we can assume they were ideal with sufficient insects emerging early enough to suck up every last

drop of nectar and spread pollen everywhere in abundance. Since then, we have enjoyed almost constant sunshine and that never goes amiss. But I sense that there must be additional factors of which we are hardly aware. This scale of abundance feels unusual. I imagine there are biological rhythms that rise and fall with the passing years and once in a while they all come together in a synchronous tidal wave, creating this extraordinary explosion of fruit, dripping and dropping from every branch and twig.

Now I cannot call it a drawback exactly, but I must confess to sometimes feeling ashamed that we are unable to harvest every last berry. When the cosmos offers you such an awesome abundance of free food it seems somewhat ungrateful not to make use of all of it. But then I think back through planetary history and visualize the hundreds of millions of autumn harvests that must have fallen to the ground uneaten, and I understand that it is all being recycled as it is supposed to.



The vegetables also are popping out as fast as we can pick. In the student beds and in Paula's children's garden tomatoes of every size, shape and colour are being picked; large and small, round, and pear-shaped, red, orange, yellow and, yes, black. Beans, squash, and zucchini and in the Veggie Garden there are also leeks and some giant onions.

But we must not forget the flowers completely and I must mention a couple that stand out. In the Rose Allee Rosa 'Irene Watts' is a gorgeous froth of pink and R. 'Autumn Sunset' is displaying several delicious tones of peach. Chives (Allium schoenoprasum) in the Herb Garden are looking extremely pretty and in the Lily Garden the Eucomis comosa are absolutely perfect.

I don't think I will quickly forget 2023, the weather, the fruit, the flowers! Always something more to enjoy.

Last April, our succulent volunteers, Adele and Carole, found a knotted mess of material in a corner of Polyhouse 3, and with gentle teasing, managed to pot up two viable sections and brought the plant back to exquisitely blooming life.

Halfway through July, look what one has produced. One flower and a bud of the uncommon and exotic Huernia zebrina.





For many years the Victoria Floral Artists Guild

(https://victoriafloralartists.ca/) has been pleased to participate in the HCP's Arts and Music in the Garden. It is fun and challenging to create large floral art designs. This year nine teams created twelve installations. The process for the selection of the design varied from project to project. For many it was a case of 'here is what we have, what can we do with it?' although one team created a story board and selected the 3 top ideas. In all cases, once the designs were complete and set up at the HCP, a team member was tasked with

maintaining the installation by keeping it hydrated and by replacing wilted flowers. It was especially challenging in this year's hot weather.



"Hearts and Flowers" – Lynda Bell was inspired by six heart-shaped wreath bases. She wired bases back-to-back to create the floral hearts at the entrance of the HCP.

"Miss Piggy – Country Gal" – Sue Weeks' Miss Piggy has graced the HCP in many guises over the years. This year she was a Country Gal to match the Country Roads installation.

"Buckets of Blooms and Sunny Sands" – Terry Whitney was inspired by the Children's Garden to create a charming children's floral installation of planted and cut flowers.



"Whirlwind" – Ann Gargett and Lynne Thompson wove an elaborate construction of dried vines and decorated it with wool and flowers in water tubes.

"Fountain of Flowers" – Caroline Haywood used two very large vases, one balanced within the other, to create her flower fountain. This installation also used many water tubes.

"Harvest Moon" –The Glass Wing team of Regina Ternus, Kim Linzey, Rich Linzey, Darlene Chase, Junko Tada, Kathy Younkers created this complex piece. The background base was painted by Rich Linzey. The 'mechanics' used to fix the flowers to the background were a collaborative effort. The water tubes were painted to blend in with the background. Kim Linzey undertook the flower installation on the painted disk.

"Setting Flight" – Another Glass Wing team design. This horizontal design was fastened to a piece of wood with metal rods and was constructed in layers. The flowers were in water tubes.



"Country Roads" – Sue Weeks, Caroline Haywood, Lynda Bell, and Lindsy Smith created a charming country design of summer flowers in crates and watering cans.


"Hanging A'Round" – Bonita Elliott, Jennifer Bennett, Teresa Moore, and Elizabeth Erskine built the large bamboo frame. Teresa wove the large circular wire structure which contained a ball of dahlias at its center.

"Ikebana" – Amanda Gaunt created a Sogetsu design of hydrangea flowers and hosta leaves in a juxtaposition box pattern.




"Tam Tam" – The team of Fay Verhagen, Kate Devlin, Carol Bissky, John Verhagen and Susanne Barker created this complex installation using material predominantly provided by Fay and John. The pillars were painted cardboard tubes containing a cement base and two-by-fours. They were topped by a cement block which supported the top post. The Tam Tam or gong was made of Agriwool (an entirely biodegradable floral foam) wrapped in chicken wire. It was decorated with gold, yellow and orange marigolds.

"Suspended Butterfly" – Glass Wing team members Darlene and Steve Chase created this driftwood and woven wire design. The center body was made of Agriwool wrapped in chicken wire.



In addition to our floral installations, the Guild also had a welcome table where a flower-related craft was sold. This year the table was organized by Lynne Thompson and sold floral tubes wrapped with decorative wire designs (doodads). These are a lovely accessory for holding flowers and other decorative material and are ideal for hanging on gift bags and gift bottles.



Mushrooms of British Columbia


You may have seen mushrooms in the news this week. The poisonous death cap (Amanita phalloides) is believed to have been brought to BC on the roots of imported trees that were planted frequently in parks and along city streets. A sighting has now been made in a garry oak meadow. The BC Centre for Disease Control and several districts, including Oak Bay, have issues alerts about it. This CBC article goes into further detail.

Should you want to delve deeper into the world of fungi the Royal BC Museum Handbook *Mushrooms of British Columbia* will get you off to a great start. As with other publications from the museum, this handbook is beautiful and practical. Excellent photographs and thorough descriptions assist in identifying over 350 species of fungal fruiting bodies.

Beyond that, there are articles throughout that discuss the world of mushrooms from a broader perspective. Conservation, climate change, medicinal and Indigenous uses, commercial harvesting and of course poisonous varieties are all given attention.

A success story close to home involves Observatory Hill, home to the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory, in Saanich. Starting in 2004 Oluna Ceska led one of the world's longest and largest mushroom studies there. Over 1,400 species were identified. Among other things, her work showed that mushrooms can be found throughout the year yet may not appear from one year to the next.

Common names of mushrooms can be unusual, describing food (fried chicken), animals (bellybutton hedgehog), humans (dead man's foot) the supernatural (witch's butter) or miscellaneous things (train wrecker). To find out more about these and others, consider borrowing *Mushrooms of British Columbia* from the HCP Library.



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
