The HCP Library Children's Nook

Did you know that October is Canadian Library Month? The HCP has a Library that is used by students, instructors, members, volunteers, and the general public. It frequently receives requests for books specifically geared to children and educators relating to plants, gardens, and horticulture, but is unable to fulfil these requests. With help from you, the HCP will create a Children's Nook within the HCP Library with a special selection of children's and educators' books related to topics such as plants, gardens, nature, food, flowers, trees, seeds, wildlife, birds and bees, climate, water, seasons, sustainability, and the environment.

Our Children and Youth programs have been serving the community for many years. The specially designed courses are popular and are regularly oversubscribed. A children's book collection would support these programs. Teaching children about plants, gardening, food production, nature, and the environment benefits the whole community.

The HCP Library Children's Nook project will instill knowledge of plants, gardens, nature and the environment into children, and plant the seeds for a career in horticulture or for learning a life skill such as growing your own food or for being a citizen who cares about the environment and the future.

ILC Rain Garden Recovery Project

In early September, I was approached by one of the Directors from Beacon Community Services about a possible collaboration rejuvenating a small garden and partnering in growing it to greater learning and community connection. This would be a new partnership between HCP, Beacon Community Services and ILC Saanichton – a well-recognized Alternative Education School operated with SD63. The garden, which is dedicated to First Nation's native plants is a piece of the desire to grow knowledge as well as commitment to reconciliation.

The vision for the garden was one which aligned with the education and partnership strategic goals of HCP. The garden is a place for story-telling and connecting the students and the greater community, that might bring great meaning and solace to the students attending ILC as well as learning opportunities with may inspire multiple ripples.



Our own Youth Program Coordinator, Paula McCormick has taken the lead on this project. The initial phase of the recovery was to visit the site and begin the process of clearing the overgrowth and for this phase we engaged our 2023 FT Program Pacific Horticulture College students. The students were very enthusiastic about participating in the Rain Garden Recovery project and it provided opportunities for discussions on native plant ID and maintenance.



The next phase will be a discussion with the stakeholders and users of the Rain Garden as to what they are needing from the space and to work with them to develop a garden design plan. Stay tuned for progress updates!



Overwintering tropicals and succulents



Tender plants will be damaged by the cold, so it is best to bring them indoors before the first frost. Protect your plants when night temperature fall to 5C and below.

We have had single digits at night this week (7C here), time to make the shift.

Our mixed planters of succulents got moved into the polyhouse this week and our students emptied the annual beds. Our annual beds contain larger tropicals that need to be lifted and potted to winter indoors.

Brugmansias, Tibouchina and Hibiscus give our beds that WOW factor when planted along with Agave and showy annuals.

Check plants carefully for pests or diseases before moving them indoors.

We keep our polyhouse just above freezing and water sparingly over the winter. Most tropicals will go dormant (drop their leaves) but should not dry out completely. In early Spring when new growth starts and day length increases, we increase the watering.



Good housekeeping is essential all winter long.

Our succulent planters are groomed regularly, removing dead and dying leaves that can potentially rot causing diseases to spread. Raising your succulents off the floor keeps them away from ground frost. Top dressing the pots with a layer of grit reduces leaves and stems from rotting.

We have fans on in the polyhouse to make sure we have good air circulation and water sparingly.

DO NOT fertilize during winter.

Last week, while hiking in the mountains, I was confronted by some stunning fall colours and I had to admit to myself that fall was indeed coming on. So back at work this week I cannot help myself from looking around to see how much the leaves have begun to change. I don't feel we have yet reached peak coloration; indeed the Japanese maple at the Takata entrance is still only a sort of grey-green. It will take perhaps another three weeks before it comes into its full glory.

However elsewhere there are some lovely signs of fall, many trees turning fiercely yellow and some shrubs displaying beautiful combinations of yellows and oranges, pinks and reds. On the steps up from the Moon Bridge to the Bonsai Garden there is a Stewartia whose foliage has started to turn through a whole delightful range of oranges and pinks. And amongst the bonsais themselves there is a beautiful Oregon Ash (Fraxinus latifolia) whose leaves have all turned a delicate pink.



In the Doris Page Garden many of the carefully chosen varieties are now just beginning to display their winter style with berries and foliage that will brighten the coming months. But already the witch hazels are dazzlingly yellow and one of them, Hamamelis x intermedia 'Arnold Promise', offers us gorgeous scarlet edging round its leaves almost as if they had been dipped in strawberry wine. On the ground cyclamen hold their lilac petals aloft like a fluttering of pink butterflies and the Mexican Orange (Choisya ternata) has leaves both yellow and green and sweet-smelling white flowers as well.

As I walk further around the Gardens, enjoying those plants that flower so belatedly, I am struck by the preponderance of pinks and reds; I had not particularly associated the fall season with red blooms but in the Lily Garden alone there are dusky pink sedums, vivid pink nerines (Nerine bowdenii), bright red alstroemerias and candy pink kniphofias. Whilst just across the path is the Fuchsia Garden, now looking very fine, and every bush is covered in reds, pinks and scarlets.



Of course there are other colours to see, especially the purples of Monkshood (Aconitum), Russian Sage (Perovskia) and several different salvias. But my eyes are drawn back to more pinks and reds, especially the vivid Scarlet Lilies (Hesperantha coccinea) and several different varieties of Japanese anemone. The Himalayan honeysuckle (Leycesteria formosa) in the Swing Bed currently has wine-dark berries hanging amongst its racemes of flowers and in the bed edging the lawn below the cottage there is a very lovely viburnum (Viburnum nudum 'Brandywine') whose leaves and berries are turning a delicate pink.

It is wonderful to watch the daily progress of the colour changes around the Gardens and though we often hope for a few more days or weeks of fine weather I think it is actually the increasingly cold nights that activate and intensify those fall colours that we find so magical. Let's enjoy this amazing kaleidoscope while we can.




